COVID-19 UPDATE

Thanks to the decline of infection rate since May 2020, some countries across Europe embrace a relaxation of stay-at-home rules. Let's have a look at partner's countries and how social life is managed.

Italy and some parts of Spain began to ease their respective lockdowns on Monday 18th 2020. In Spain, urban hotspots remain under lockdown but there are still some places where people meet friends and family in outdoorspaces. In Italy, restaurants, bars and shops reopened for customers, as long as they can find a way to deal with social distancing measures. Portugal had already started to open parks, factories and building sites, but also bars and restaurants for takeaway service. In Germany, many shops, playgrounds and public spaces are already open and practicing sports is allowed, regarding restaurants and hotels the decision is left to states.In Greece, the third phase of returning to normality occured and middle and high schools classes opened, as well as shopping malls, but people are still required to keep social distancing as well as wear masks. Sweden stands as an exception as it never imposed confinement measures, but there was still a ban for gatherings of more than 50 people and social distancing rules were set up in gyms, restaurants and bars.
